COUNSELING AND GUIDANCE SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS AT DRAKE HIGH SCHOOL

Counseling and Guidance Counseling and guidance are a critical component of Drake's support for students. Upon entering Drake, each student will be assigned a counselor who will assist and support each student's academic, social/emotional, career and personal adjustment needs by developing a four-year educational plan as well as post-secondary educational/career plans. The Counseling staff provide grade specific informational programs and communications for parents and students throughout the year. Get to know your child's counselor. They make a positive impact on our students every day!

College & Career Program (room 211) The College & Career Center provides a wealth of materials designed to assist students with college search and career planning. Our library has career abstracts, college brochures, military options, study abroad/summer programs and scholarship information. We offer web-based college, career, and scholarship searches and continually host college reps, career speakers, essay workshops and diagnostic practice tests to help students better prepare for the SAT/ACT. Students can access part-time job listings, obtain work permits and find tutors available through our online listing. School to Career Program Students 16+ can participate in internships available to them through the school-to-career program, in room 211. The program provides students with an extensive database of public and private organizations that accept high school students for internships throughout the school year and Summer.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO SUPPORT DRAKE STUDENTS

Bay Area Community Resources (BACR) Students have access to on-site counseling/mental health services through BACR, with parental permission. Two counselors and one intern at Drake provide support for stress, depression, substance abuse, academic pressure and interpersonal relationship issues. They provide crisis counseling as needed and primarily work with students who do not have medical coverage for mental health issues outside of school. Referrals are made through the student's school counselor, parent, school administrator or are self-referred.

Peer Resource Peer Resource is an elective class where students are trained to support fellow students by providing peer education and counseling, conflict-mediation, parent education panels, and outreach at local middle schools when requested. During and After School Homework Support for Students and Academic Peer Tutors Students benefit from Tutorial Class Wednesday & Friday from 10:00-10:50 am, providing them with an opportunity to work on homework, engage in a study group, or get help from a teacher.
